These courses cover: identifying and evaluating educational technology tools for specific learning objectives; implementing technology to create engaging and interactive lesson plans; using technology for differentiated instruction to cater to diverse learners. Additionally, our students learn UDL principles, apply these principles to a case study and report their findings at a scholars' forum. Assessment: We utilize performance-based assessments that require teacher candidates to demonstrate their technology integration skills. This involves creating a technology-infused unit plan or presenting a lesson that effectively utilizes technology to enhance learning outcomes. Students also host an education technology night for current educators and members of the campus which they are evaluated on. Lastly, we gather feedback from cooperating teachers who supervise our candidates during student teaching placements. This feedback specifically evaluates the candidate's ability to utilize the district's technology and assessment platforms to effectively respond to student learning.
