



ABOUT BILL ROEDY

Distinguished soldier, global media pioneer, freedom champion, and global health leader Bill Roedy "might be the most interesting man in the world," says Mike Fries, CEO and Vice Chair of Liberty Global. "He's somebody who commanded nuclear silos in the Cold War, was friends with Mandela, and partied with Bono." Upon graduation, Mr. Roedy volunteered for duty in Vietnam, earning the Bronze Star, Air Medal, and Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry. He then commanded nuclear missiles as part of NATO and received the Meritorious Service Medal. Graduating from Harvard with an MBA in 1979, Mr. Roedy joined HBO in the nascent days of cable television. Ten years later, he led a relentless expansion of MTVN Europe with a unique model of respecting and reflecting local audience diversity, including behind the Iron Curtain, bringing a ground-breaking window to the West. Mr. Roedy was soon promoted to Chair and CEO of MTVNI, where he built a global operation (200plus channels, 200-plus countries, 30-plus languages, for 2 billion-plus people) and pioneered the concept of global corporate responsibility. Under Mr. Roedy's leadership, MTVNI became the world leader in fighting HIV/AIDS with its "Staying Alive" campaign, and he chaired the Global Business Coalition addressing the UN General Assembly. His far-reaching global health roles have included the first Ambassador for UNAIDS, Chair of the American Foundation for AIDS Research (amfAR) and Vice Chair for the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunizations (GAVI), which has saved millions of children's lives. Mr. Roedy's numerous awards include UN Global Citizen, the Emmy Founder Award, the West Point Distinguished Graduate Award, and induction into the Cable Hall of Fame. Regarding Mr. Roedy's work in the global health arena, Jeb Bush, 43rd Governor of Florida, says, "Bill is without a doubt a distinguished citizen of our world."

In 2011, Mr. Roedy received an honorary degree and delivered the 54th John Findley Green Foundation Lecture at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri, joining Winston Churchill, Margaret Thatcher, and Mikhail Gorbachev as speakers in the College's most distinguished lectureships. Mr. Roedy is a Churchill Fellow of Westminster College.

Mr. Roedy had the audacious idea of bringing MTV to East Germany, helping topple the Wall that divided the country for more than three decades. Like Westminster College, he possesses a generous section of the Berlin Wall. Mr. Roedy's piece is inscribed with a personal message from former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev that says, "Music is more powerful than missiles."

America's National Churchill Museum and Westminster College salute Mr. Roedy's tenacious spirit and Churchillian bravery, which served to tear down a wall while pioneering history in a new direction.



CONNECTING WINSTON CHURCHILL TO THE NEXT GENERATION

When former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and many other world leaders followed in Mr. Churchill's footsteps and visited Westminster to deliver messages of freedom and liberty, a Communist threat was something of a stalemate.

Just a little more than a year before Mr. Gorbachev delivered his speech titled, "The River of Time and the Imperative of Action," Westminster eagerly welcomed former President Ronald Reagan for a similar purpose.

On November 9, 1990, Mr. Reagan proudly dedicated eight carefully chosen sections of the Berlin Wall that Mr. Churchill's granddaughter, artist and Churchill Fellow The Hon. Edwina Sandys, MBE, creatively formed into an original sculpture titled *Breakthrough*. As he stood on campus in front of those pieces of the Wall, Mr. Reagan delivered a powerful message that served as final punctuation to his famous "Tear Down This Wall" speech given at the Brandenburg Gate just a little more than three years earlier.


Today, in contrast, our students and faculty members find themselves regularly examining issues of global significance through thoughtful, scholarly assignments and discussions, keeping the tenacious spirit of the British Bulldog alive.

Westminster students are encouraged to examine global issues and ask pertinent questions, particularly following recent Russian aggression in Ukraine: "Is Churchill's message more relevant than ever? How can our rich history remain relevant? If business can 'rock,' as former Chair and CEO of MTV Bill Roedy says in his similarly titled memoir, can history be hip?"

Beginning freshman year, all Westminster students engage with five "domains" that are critical to leadership development. They are then challenged, throughout their four years at the College, to become "leaders of character" in service to the good of society. All students are encouraged to take on campus leadership opportunities, which are numerous as a result of Westminster's small size. Interwoven into the foundational emphasis on leadership are many lectureships made possible through generous endowments, allowing students to listen to world leaders in the College's uniquely intimate setting. Many meet the lecturers face to face. Often, students major in Security Studies, Global & Transnational Studies, or Political Science as a result of their associations with Westminster's lecturers. leading to lucrative careers at the U.S. Capitol or other prestigious locations throughout the world.



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HOW A 17TH CENTURY LONDON CHURCH ARRIVED AT WESTMINSTER COLLEGE

In the 1960s, Westminster College undertook what *The Times* of London referred to as "perhaps the biggest jigsaw puzzle in the history of architecture." Westminster shipped the ancient Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Aldermanbury — redesigned/rebuilt in the 17th century by Royal Architect Sir Christopher Wren following the Great Fire of London — from England to the United States. The project rescued St. Mary's from almost two decades of ruin after an incendiary bomb heavily damaged the church during the Blitz of World War II. Westminster arranged to rebuild the structure stone by stone on campus as a memorial to Winston Churchill's "The Sinews of Peace," or "Iron Curtain," speech delivered at Westminster on March 5, 1946. St. Mary the Virgin, Aldermanbury, today stands on campus as the centerpiece of America's National Churchill Museum.

In the decades following, as a result of Mr. Churchill's speech, the foundation of Westminster College's core value of leadership was solidified. Today, the College consistently acts as a platform and key venue for world leaders to deliver transformative ideas to a global audience. Westminster's students receive a front-row seat as history is made.

Incidentally, Mr. Churchill himself endorsed the idea of relocating the bombed church from London to Westminster's campus, calling the ambitious project an "imaginative concept." Ambition and audacious imagination remain Westminster College's specialty.



A GLOBAL STAGE IN THE MIDDLE OF AMERICA

Everyone roots for the underdog.

Think of David and Goliath. Cassius Clay and Sonny Liston. Charlie Brown and Lucy (and his football). Even William Shakespeare recognized the significance of small when he penned dialogue for Helena in Act 3, Scene 2, of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*: "Thou she be but little she is fierce."

Through his numerous wartime battles, Winston Churchill had direct experience with the dynamics between the underdog and the bully. Fittingly, his warnings about Soviet aggression came in the most unlikely of places: Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri — a humble location in the middle of rural America.

Westminster is the scrappy little fighter who continues to punch outside of its weight class: Mr. Churchill's "Iron Curtain" speech laid the foundation for other world leaders and dignitaries to deliver messages of significance that have achieved staying power. Past and recent speakers include former Presidents Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush and Gerald Ford; former U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright; U.S. General (Ret.) and former CIA Director David H. Petraeus; former Israeli Ambassador Ron Dermer; and Jeh Johnson, former U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security, to name just a few.

More recently, former world chess champion and political activist Garry Kasparov, as well as the Right Hon. James Cleverly, MP, have delivered powerful messages concerning Soviet aggression in Ukraine and concerns about newfound threats to international peace. America's National Churchill Museum on the campus of Westminster College is the fitting location for messages of such impact. Despite its small size and rural location, Westminster is a small college with a global impact — both yesterday and today.
